
MISSION

- 1,203 students enrolled in one of HCC's 60 STEAM associate degree or certificate programs.
- 12 students participated in a paid master training to become STEAM leaders on campus
- 50 students in the STEAM Club increased campus-wide engagement in STEAM activities
- As the only community college in the nation, Housatonic became a certified Carnegie STEM Excellence Pathway Provider, a three-part training module to improve STEM education at Housatonic and in greater Bridgeport .

Igniting Entrepreneurship

The VentureLab encourages student's growth of entrepreneurship and provides space and resources to incubate business concepts to business development. It has become an increasingly important resource to assist students with the capital, know-how, and skills necessary to test and launch business dreams.

HIGHLIGHTS

- A first-ever virtual Elevator Pitch Competition featured 20 students vying for grants up to \$1,000 to help grow their business idea.
- 25 grants, ranging from \$500 to \$2,000, were awarded to students to support different phases of their business concept such as start-up costs, website development, online publishing and promotion, participation at trade shows, and more.
- Over 50 students received one-on-one mentoring with an entrepreneur in residence as well as Business Department faculty members. This high-touch support has become invaluable for students advancing their business concepts.

Inspiring Creativity

Long considered one of the premier community college art collections in the country, the Housatonic Museum of Art (HMA) is a powerful resource for students, faculty and staff at the Housatonic Community College, as well as for the Southern New England region.

- The HMA has been nominated by Congressman Jim Himes for the 2021 National Medal for Museum and Library Service. This award honors outstanding American museums and libraries that have made extraordinary contributions to their communities.
- 3 exhibits featuring locally and nationally renowned artists were presented in the Burt Chernow Galleries. Exhibitions included:
 - Close to the Line: Mari Rantanen and Kirsten Reynolds
 - Through a Dark Wood, Wandering: Survey show of sculpture by Joseph Saccio
 - Rachel Owens' installation, The Hypogean Tip, commissioned by the HMA, was inspired by Bridgeport's historic neighborhood Little Liberia, a community founded by Free Blacks.
- Completing its 20th year, the HMA's Student Docent Program offered Bridgeport middle school students a curriculum entitled "Take a Turn into Little Liberia." The Spring 2020 program was suspended due to COVID-19 and materials are being developed to offer an online version.
- Restoration care included two important works in the painting collection: Jimmy Ernst's "Instant II" and Sally Michel Avery's "Mother Nursing," cleaned and restored in 2020, are on view in Made In Connecticut: Celebrating 25 Years of the CT Art Trail at the Wadsworth Atheneum.



Valued at \$1 million, the HMA received over 600 photographs by renowned sports photojournalists and photo essayists, including the picture above by Walter looss titled Blue Dunk.

Online virtual tours and programs were developed to allow continued access during the pandemic to the HMA's collection.

A similar installation by Jongil Ma is pictured above. This permanent installation at HCC will be available to view in early 2021.

Entering its 6th year, the Family Economic Security Program (FESP) has been an innovative partnership between Housatonic Community College, the HCC Foundation and Fairfield County's Community Foundation's Fund for Women & Girls.

FESP has served 413 students; 223 of these students have graduated with an associates degree or have transferred to a four-year higher education institution. FESP's design of wrap-around supports and student coaching continues to uplift it as an exemplary model for student retention and achievement.



"FESP to me means support in every way possible. As a first-generation college student, it has truly been a journey and my FESP coaches helped make my transition as smooth as possible. Building Future Solutions

The Advanced Manufacturing Technology Center (AMTC) continues to be one of HCC's premier programs, creating a pipeline of skilled workers to enter and support the growing 21st century manufacturing industry. It is an intense, 9-month certificate program that directly leads to a meaningful job and career path.

HIGHLIGHTS

- 86 students participated in the AMTC; 36 full-time students on campus and 50 students in the College Connections program at Derby, Bassick and Kolbe High Schools.
- The 6th annual American Manufacturing Hall of Fame inducted Ashcroft, Inc., Medtronics PLC, Microboard Processing Inc., Pratt & Whitney, and Sonics & Materials Inc. The event raised important funds to support student scholarships in HCC's AMTC.
- In response to the shortage of PPE for front line workers, Housatonic's AMTC instructor and students designed and produced over 500 face shields and over 850 headbands that were distributed to healthcare providers.



Supporting Students Impacted by the Pandemic

Since March 2020, the Coronavirus has upended the lives of most students at Housatonic Community College. Students lost jobs and wages, became sick or were suddenly caring for an ill loved one. Many were struggling to care for their own children while persisting through their courses at HCC, in a new virtual environment. Already faced with so many challenges on a daily basis, many students were now in crisis and at-risk of dropping out.

During this same time, the HCC Foundation received an outpouring of generosity. Hundreds of grocery gift cards were provided to students, as well as help covering utility bills, rent and other basic needs. Fifty chrome books were provided to students to support their digital learning. Over \$75,000 was received to care for over 200 HCC students during this unprecedented time.



Antonia, an HCC student majoring in political science with dreams of becoming a civil rights attorney and Congresswoman, lost all three of her jobs due to shutdowns of all non-essential job-sites. Her husband, a service writer at a car dealership, also lost his job due to a COVID-19 related layoff. With a five-year old son and Antonia's brother living at home, the couple was struggling to make ends meet.

"When I got the check from the Foundation I started crying, it felt like the world had been lifted and I could breathe." said Antonia. "I was able to buy groceries, put gas in my car and pay the light bill. It was amazing."

Thanks to Bank of America and Social Venture Partners (SVP) CT, an innovative pilot was created to rapidly respond to employment needs of workers displaced because of COVID-19.

A cohort of students participated in an accelerated Sterile Processing Technician program at HCC. Tuition and all related costs per student were funded by Bank of America and SVP. This 7-week certificate program prepared students to enter a new career path. It is a model program that influenced additional funding from CARES ACT to provide similar training opportunities in the healthcare field for displaced workers at HCC.


